## Our Preparation for Easter

Easter occupies the very center of our Christian faith. It is the summit toward which the entire story of salvation rises and the wellspring from which our hope continually flows. Because this holy day stands as the “heart and soul” of our spiritual life, it is only fitting that we enter into a meaningful season of preparation as we journey toward its celebration.

The weeks of Lent invite us into a sacred rhythm of reflection, repentance, and renewal. This penitential season is not meant to burden us but to awaken us—to clear away the noise, soften our hearts, and make room for the transforming grace of Christ. Through prayer, self examination, and acts of compassion, we are drawn more deeply into the mystery of God’s love revealed in the cross and resurrection.

This year, our community will be blessed with additional opportunities to walk this Lenten path together. The community Lenten services will offer moments of shared worship, teaching, and fellowship that can strengthen our resolve and enrich our spiritual journey. Coming together as one body, seeking, listening, and preparing, reminds us that faith is never a solitary endeavor. We grow best when we grow together. Below are the dates and locations of the Community Lenten Services. There will be a lunch served after each service for a suggested \$7 donation.

As we move toward Easter, may this season shape us in ways that endure long after the lilies fade and the alleluias are sung. May our preparation be sincere, our hearts be open, and our hope be renewed in the One who makes all things new.

## ***From the Minister***

I know that some of my friends have cut down on the time they spend on their electronic devices for Lent. That is admirable. I'm always impressed when people say they have given up one of their addictions (chocolate, Diet Mountain Dew, scrolling on their smart phone), for these 40 days. I also think it is very intriguing that Mr. Jobs' invention has worked its way into the same category as dark chocolate with sea salt when it comes to things we cannot resist. Probably a book to be written in there somewhere.

I have not given up my phone or any of its apps for Lent. In fact, I have found myself opening my weather app more and more and more these days. Each time I check the 10-day forecast, I whisper a prayer that the predicted high temperatures will be well above 50 degrees. Like many people in these parts, I like winter, but at this point in the year I am more than ready to be warm for a change. So, I keep checking the weather and hoping it will change. I know, however, that according to Punxsutawney Phil, the Farmer's Almanac, as well as the astronomical calendar, the first day of spring is on or around March 20, a good three more weeks out. I'll need to bide my time, as they say. Or, to put it more precisely, I'll need to wait.

I'm not very good at waiting. So, it seems like Lent will be an opportune time for me to work on that a bit. Fr. Richard Rohr, back in 2023, wrote a book called *Just This*. In it, he provides some insight for readers regarding how we might learn to wait – or to just be in the moment. As I understand it, one thing I need to get better at is being in the moment. In other words, instead of constantly thinking about – and worrying about – what is next, I need to just take a breath and consider what is right in front of me. Jesus said it very well in chapter 6 of Matthew's Gospel – "So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today."

Fr. Rohr suggests that living in the moment has many benefits, one of which is learning that even pain and suffering can lead to growth. If I don't pass over it too quickly, if I don't just wish it away, the suffering I am enduring now can bring about good things in my life, like making me a deeper person and a more faithful Christian.

Miriam Diephouse-McMillan, in her book, *Sacred Balance*, (which the Contemplative Prayer group has been reading and discussing), has a chapter on "practicing the presence of God." The concept is akin to what you may have heard about mindfulness. "Practicing the Presence of God means actively attending to God's presence during daily tasks. This can be done during any activity: taking a shower, folding laundry, running errands, or driving to work." There is a reason, I think, that she includes the word "practice" in the chapter title. I have found that opening myself to the presence of God is something that takes quite a bit of practice. I looked at my weather app again this morning. The ten-day forecast includes some warmer temperatures, including a couple days up around 68 degrees. However, I'm pretty sure there will be more cold weather in the days between now and the spring equinox. So, I'll be trying not to think about how much I'd like to plunge my cold feet into some warm sand on a beach in Bermuda. Instead, I'll be considering the words of scripture and trying to remember that there is a place on the earth for hot and cold temperatures, for rain and snow alike. (cf. Psalm 147 and Isaiah 55) And I will wait. And while I wait, I will try to consider what cold temperatures and even snow can teach me. And, perhaps, I will also begin to think and dream about summer and how much warmer it will be. And maybe I will consider, at that time, writing a few words for this page which I will use to complain about how hot it is and how much I'm looking forward to the fall, and the change of weather.

## Our Lenten Dustiness, the Greatness of our Faith and Our Playlists

Recently on the way to school Jackson wanted to play a song for me that he loves. "Sure, let's hear it" I remarked. So it began. I will abbreviate for you here as there are many lyrics in between the lines.

*Once I was seven years old, my mama told me "Go make yourself some friends, or you'll be lonely"*

*Once I was 11 years old, my daddy told me.... Once I was 20 years old, my story got told...*

*Soon, we'll be 30 years old, our songs have been sold...*

*Soon, I'll be 60 years old, will I think the world is cold? Will my children visit me?*

I was a bit weepy at the end when he said, "Mom, you're 41". I laughed and said, "yeah, I'm not 60 yet!" I then realized I was closer to 60 than 20. I jumped back into the moment, "When I get older will you come visit me?" He responded, "OF COURSE!!"

I don't know if it is just me but as more time passes I feel a sect of humanity wanting to dig in its heels against what is inevitable... aging and death. From the anti-aging fixes & creams to a futuristic A.I. world it seems more and more people are longing to avoid what will come to us all. Parting. Ash Wednesday and the Lenten season turn the opposite way and point our eyes right to it. But as people of faith, we have conviction and hope past the grave and in the resurrection.

### ***What does this have to do with music ministry at First Christian?***

At the recent Polyphony conference I attended in Nashville, we were given the question, "What hymns have meant the most to you and gotten you through the hard days?" The answers were all varied and for many different reasons. So my question to you as people of faith is, "What hymns and sacred songs have meant the most to you? What playlist would you put together for your life and have you written those songs down? Does anyone else besides you know these are on your playlist?"

As the Minister of Music & Organist at First Christian, the funerals I have served have been well into the hundreds. Some have been anticipated, some shocking, some for ages into the hundreds and some just out of high school. For each funeral, music has been both healing, aiding and celebratory.

Many of you reading this have trusted me by handing me notes of music that move you in heavenly ways. Some have come up right after worship with notes saying, "I want that piece at my funeral." You may have heard an organ/piano piece and said, 'that's one that I definitely want...' or a new hymn/worship song that just summed everything you believe into words.

**Your Homework**—In serving in this music ministry, my hope is to continually introduce ever evolving pieces that may eventually add to your playlist. A playlist that is constantly changing based on your place in life. My hope is that you take time to think about these pieces (anthems, hymns, praise songs) and write them down. My hope is that you start to think about your playlist that encompasses you. My hope is that you trust me enough to even share them with me.

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Planning funeral music is ultimately an act of trust in God's promises. It allows you to say, even now, "I know the song the church will sing when my earthly journey is complete." And what a beautiful thing it is when, in a moment of grief, the church's song rises strong, carrying sorrow, proclaiming hope, and reminding us all that in Christ, death never has the final word.

If you would like help thinking through meaningful hymn choices or documenting your wishes, your church staff would be honored to walk alongside you.

I'll close by sharing a few words from a piece that gives me hope and I hope would give others hope in the time of celebration of life that I know will come for me.

*There's a peace I've come to know, though my heart and flesh may fail.*

*There's an anchor for my soul. I can say "It is well".*

*Jesus has overcome and the grave is overwhelmed.*

*The victory is won, He is risen from the dead.*

*And I will rise when He calls my name.*

*No more sorrow, no more pain.*

*I will rise on eagles' wings. Before my God fall on my knees. And rise.*

*There's a day that's drawing near, when this darkness breaks to light.*

*And the shadows disappear and my faith shall be my eyes.*

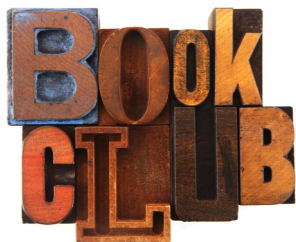

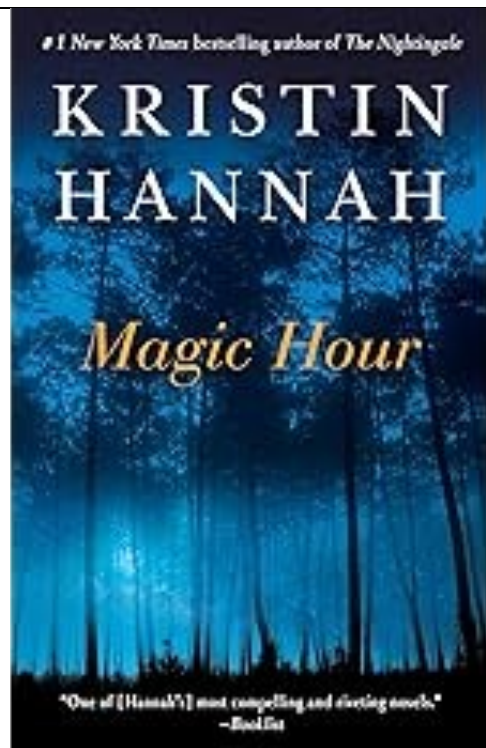


## A Novel Idea

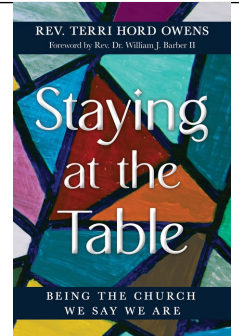

## Church Board Meetings: Sharing, Listening, and Leading Together

Church board meetings are a vital part of congregational life, offering a transparent forum for sharing information about church operations and upcoming events, ministry updates, and conducting official church business. These meetings are led by the Official Board, which includes the Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary, Treasurer, along with all Trustees, Deacons, Elders, Presidents of CWF, CMF and CYF, and each Ministry Team Chair. Their role is to guide the church’s direction, review reports, and make decisions that shape our community. Voting privileges at board meetings include all members of the Official Board. All members of a Ministry Team attending the board meeting may also vote, except for legal matters such as transfer of property, staff contracts, etc.

For the official board members, attending these meetings is crucial. A quorum - a minimum number of board members present - is required to vote on decisions and move church initiatives forward. Without quorum, important actions may be delayed, impacting our ability to serve effectively.

Church board meetings are more than just business - they are a space for sharing, listening, and leading together. By attending, you support transparency, encourage engagement, and help uphold the church’s mission.

Our next board meeting is Sunday March 8, in the fellowship hall, immediately following our worship service.

### *Points Along the Path of Prayer*

Our contemplative prayer group spends time in worship – scripture, spoken prayer, silent prayer – which we understand to be the ground of the contemplative life to which we are called in Christ. Susan Forshey ([contemplativecottage.com](http://contemplativecottage.com)) shares a view of the contemplative life:

Contemplative life is not about creating a physically quiet life. Contemplative life can be lived in noisy contexts: families, cities, work, commutes, instability, illness. One need not be a monk to be contemplative. The first lesson a monk learns is that even in the quietest environment, interior thoughts and feelings can be deafening. The drive to gain our worth from activities, a roar. We take our interior noise with us wherever we go, no matter how quiet our surroundings.

Contemplative life is about cultivating a quiet life internally. Rather than silence, it requires a gentle practice of stepping back from the deluge of thoughts, feelings, and activities, in order to gain a wider perspective. We are more than our transitory thoughts and feelings. We are more than our doings.

Saying yes to every expectation or demand does not make us holy or a better Christian. More likely, it will make us exhausted, short-tempered, prone to illness, and joyless. We are spread thin, "sort of stretched, like butter scraped over too much bread." We will find it hard to be present to those nearest us as we disappear into our never-ending to-do lists, an unforgiving measure of our value. God's gentle voice becomes harder to hear, even while doing those things we do in God's service.

I invite you to stop for 5 minutes, just 5, and breathe. Attend to your life, attend to the parish of your soul. Whatever task, thought or feeling is at the forefront, acknowledge it, give it to God, and let it go. Repeat. Keep breathing, attending, acknowledging and letting go, seeking the quiet at the center of the storm.

This is the foundation of a contemplative life.

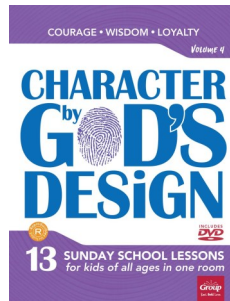
